Just Who Do You Think You Are: An examination of identity theft in the age of new technologies

"Identity theft" is a term commonly used to mean the unauthorized collection and fraudulent use of someone else's personal information. The personal information collected by "identity thieves" may be used in a variety of improper ways, including gaining illegal access to bank accounts, obtaining credit and taking out loans, obtaining accommodation, and in other transactions, all carried out by masquerading as the victim. It is the fraudulent use of someone else's personal information that lies at the heart of the phenomenon known as ID theft. Many actors, both in the private and public sectors, have been accused of facilitating ID theft, often inadvertently but sometimes not. A multi-sectorial approach is needed to combat the problem and a variety of stakeholders have essential roles to play in attempting to reduce the incidence of ID theft. This presentation will provide a background to the subject matter and an investigation into the techniques of ID theft. Legislative approaches and case law will then be examined, both domestically and internationally, as well as the enforcement of the laws. Finally, policy approaches of government, non-government and corporate bodies will be discussed.
